
Women's History Month Is Long Over. How Do We Keep Empowering Women The Other 334 Days Of The Year?

"Christine Wormuth, who led President Joe Biden's transition team at the Pentagon, got an overwhelmingly warm reception from members of the Senate Armed Services Committee. They suggested her nomination would be approved by the Senate. If confirmed, she would be one of the more powerful officials in a defense establishment long dominated by men." Read More.
