

To Read: Invisible Women: Data Bias in a World Designed for Men

Published in 2019, "Invisible Women" by author Caroline Criado Perez explores the gender data gap. In one excerpt, for example, Perez writes, "Women tend to sit further forward than men when driving. This is because we are on average shorter. Our legs need to be closer to reach the pedals, and we need to sit more upright to see clearly over the dashboard. This is not, however, the 'standard seating position.' Women are 'out of position' drivers. And our willful deviation from the norm means that we are at greater risk of internal injury on frontal collisions." Perez's methodical and deliberate discoveries make this book one to add to your reading list.



To Watch: Disney recently released "**Turning Red**" which offers a poignant depiction of a girl who enters puberty. It is the first Pixar/Disney movie written and directed by an Asian American woman and the studio's first film directed, written, and produced by women. **Domee Shi**, who also directed Pixar's short film, **Bao**, uses the story of middle school student Meilin "Mei" Lee to talk about being a young woman and Mei's Chinese second-generation identity.



To Stay Informed: Non-profit newsroom, **The 19th**, details **how women are becoming exceedingly detached from the political process**, just as the midterm cycle is coming up. "41% of women say they're more tuned out from politics- a 12-point increase compared to polling conducted last year. The figure was higher for women of color (49%) and women under 40 (55%)." It's not that women collectively don't understand that elections are important, but many women have been stretched thin and don't have the capacity to be more in tune with what is happening in today's politics.
